We wish nothing but the best for these student teachers as they continue to pursue careers in education. Thank you for coming to our school and helping our students learn new things and grow each and every day.

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
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#### Fourth Grade Excels



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
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#### Video Game Review: WWE 2K23


Teachers who participated traced their hands and wrote their reasoning for teaching/serving at the school on the back.


