



Artist of the Month


Mrs. Strough's 7th grade art class made custom masks, and a lot of them really seemed to enjoy the activity. Once their masks were finished, some of them even went on to wear their masks around the school hallways. When asked about the process of making the masks, Mrs. Stough said, "First, the students sketched the animal faces that they were interested in creating. Then, they listed the colors that they would need to use. Afterward, they were able to begin using newspaper and tape to create the different features that they attached to their pre-made masks." Drake Ginther and Katelyn Shisler used different materials to make elephant trunks out of twisted paper and tape. Some students also used cardboard to create features for their masks such as the gorilla ears that Alexa Horne and Addison Graham made.

Next, the students had to learn how to accurately dip and wipe away paste so that their

newspaper would be able to dry in a 24 hour period. The students applied approximately 10 coats of newspaper. This was used in thin strips and attached in crosssecting patterns to add support to their previously formed features, such as the mouse ears on Emily Santa Cruz and Jayden Wilson's. Then, the students chose colored paper as one of the last steps. This paper was not needed to add support. Instead, it was used to cover all the surface area, even portions

of the back. Bryson Hume, Drevyn Spence, and Payden Fones used green paper to cover their turtle masks. Once they applied their colored paper, the students added finishing touches like eyes, nostrils, ears, and whiskers to make their masks look realistic. Some of the students made sure that the elastic on their masks was still attached, and a couple of them wanted to put holes in their masks so that they could see through them. When their masks were finished, they were not displayed in the building because students were excited to take them home.

Thank you to Mrs. Stough for teaching her students how to make masks and allowing them to have fun with their art projects!
