Step 3: Once water is boiling drop the hot dogs in

carefully, so as not to splash water.

Step 4: Let the hot dogs boil for 4-5 minutes but if they are frozen leave them in for 8-10 minutes.

Step 5: Take the hot dogs out and serve on a bun.

Good side dishes to pair with hot dogs are chips or mac and cheese. Toppings I recommend are ketchup, mustard, and maybe pickle relish if you like it.
